#### In school comparison

- In reading, PPG children generally make close to the same progress as non-PPG children, although there is a gap in most cases.
- In Writing, PPG children generally make close to the same amount of progress as their non PPG peers. However, in five of the cohorts this is still below expected progress.
- The general picture of progress for our PPG children is not as positive as it should be
  and the average progress of our PPG is less than that of our non PPG children in all but
  one cohort.
- 30% of children that are PPG are also SEN.

#### How will we measure the impact of the PPG on pupils?

PPG pupils are a focus group for our pupil progress meetings. The progress that they make each half term is measured against previous progress rates and against their peer group. These are discussed in depth with class teachers at each pupil progress meeting. This is then tracked by the Pupil Premium Champion who co-ordinates with class teachers to accelerate the progress of PPG children.

The progress of children who receive support from the teacher led small group is tracked separately.

The well-being of pupils is monitored and tracked through their engagement with learning, through close monitoring by adults in school.
